

# DAI in Indonesia: More than 30 Years of Partnership and Results



Our expatriate and local national staff—many of whom have worked in Indonesia for decades—have provided innovative solutions in natural resources management, agricultural development, water supply and sanitation, governance reform, and disaster relief.

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## Select Recent Projects for USAID

### URBAN WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE, 2011-2016, \$33.7 million

#### Sample Activities

- Conduct rapid assessments in 42 districts and cities, choosing 31 target locations.
- Execute “partnership agreements” with local governments in target districts and cities.
- Provide technical, financial, and accountability assistance about sanitation to water utilities, businesses, and local government institutions.
- Raise urban awareness of the economic and health benefits of sanitation.
- Build capacity for implementing and expanding efforts within civil society groups, water utilities, and government institutions.

#### Select Results

- Household water costs decreased 39 percent.
- More than 4,500 people—including 1,500 women— participated in training.
- More than 750 households obtained new water connections and improved sanitation facilities under a microcredit program.

### STRATEGIES AGAINST FLU EMERGENCE, 2011-2013, \$7.2 million

#### Sample Activities

- Facilitate public-private alliances in high-risk districts to improve biosecurity and farming practices and reduce H5N1 among poultry.
- Identify/apply incentives for the private poultry industry to increase biosecurity practices.
- Implement safe commercial farming strategies.
- Coordinate efforts of partners, poultry industry.
- Deploy strategic communication, including about the symptoms and risk factors of H5N1-related illness so households can recognize them and respond appropriately.

#### Select Results

- Created SAFE Teaching Farms that so far has received more than 300 farmer and students.
- Biosecurity and good farming practices implemented at 188 farms.



- Booklet “Effective Measures to Prevent the Spread of Disease” widely used.
- Established SMS that regularly delivers messages on biosecurity and good farming.

### ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES PROGRAM (ESP), 2004–2010, \$54.8 million

#### Sample Activities

- Partner with municipal water companies to develop affordable access to piped water.
- Plan and facilitate solid waste management and clean water and sanitation infrastructure.
- Strengthen watershed management and delivery of key environmental services such as wastewater collection and treatment.

#### Select Results

- Gave nearly 300,000 households (more than 1.8 million people) access to clean water.
- Developed 83 community-based solid waste management systems serving 38,000 people.
- Rehabilitated 52,561 degraded hectares.
- Improved local management of 214,468 hectares of high conservation-value forest.
- Trained more than 36,000 people in natural resources and biodiversity conservation and 7,800 others at project field schools.
- Brokered 22 agreements between municipal water companies and local banks; 12,000 households gained access to clean water; leveraged \$1.2 million for the new connections.
- \$29.9 million of resources leveraged to expand impact of ESP work.

## SENADA, INDONESIA COMPETITIVENESS PROGRAM, 2005–2009, \$18.6 million

### Sample Activities

- Document the mechanics of the relationships between actors in select industry value chains.
- Prioritize systemic constraints and opportunities within value chains.
- Provide promising firms with strategic assistance in finance, production, quality improvement, and marketing.

### Select Results

- Increased jobs and productivity across five industry value chains (furniture, auto parts, garments, home furnishings, and footwear) and one service industry (information and communications technology).
- Increased furniture/home furnishings exports.
- Supported innovations in products and services, increasing market acceptance.
- Instituted stakeholders (producer groups, international brands, and government counterparts) in industry activities.
- Created and implemented a RegMAP tool that enabled regulatory mapping and analysis.
- Accelerated business licensing. For example, 916 business licenses were obtained over a six-month period in Sidoarjo Regency compared with the biannual average of 378.



## ORANGUTAN CONSERVATION SERVICES PROGRAM (OCSP), 2007–2010, \$11 million

### Sample Activities

- Support revision of regulations and laws that combat habitat destruction and strengthen community monitoring of forest activities.
- Generate private sector support for orangutan conservation.
- Raise awareness of the importance of forest conservation for biodiversity preservation.

### Select Results

- Improved management of 1.3 million hectares critical to orangutans and other unique species.
- Convened key sectors for input into the Ministry of Forestry's National Orangutan Strategy and Action Plan 2007–2017 that was announced by Indonesia's President at the UN Climate Change Conference in Bali in 2007.
- In East Kalimantan, the indigenous Dayak people of Wehea were awarded Indonesia's highest environmental honor for protecting and managing 38,000 hectares of rainforest. The area—an important water and medicinal plant source for the Wehea people and home



to 500 to 750 orangutans—was declared protected by the local government, helping fund its management while private firms funded infrastructure.

## AGRIBUSINESS MARKET AND SUPPORT ACTIVITY (AMARTA), 2006–2009, \$18.2 million

### Sample Activities

- Promote the benefits of competitiveness through university curricula, national and regional conferences, agribusiness alliances, training, and media campaigns.
- Ensure that enterprises have the inputs, financing, technical know-how, information, and incentives to respond to market demand.

### Select Results

- Brought 26,000 hectares under improved technologies or management practices.
- Assisted nearly 600 producer organizations; water user, trade, and business associations; and community-based organizations.
- Exports of Sulawesi cocoa rose 49 percent.
- Improved farmer-buyer relationships.

## COMMUNITY-BASED AVIAN INFLUENZA CONTROL PROJECT (CBAIC), 2006–2010, \$26.2 million

### Sample Activities

- Collaborate with USAID AI partners including FAO, WHO, ILRI, the Ministry of Agriculture AI Campaign Management Unit (CMU), the Ministry of Health, and local government officials on sustainable risk reduction.
- Design, apply local mobilization programs.

### Select Results

- Collaborated with Indonesian Red Cross and Muhammadiyah to train and certify 80 master trainers, who, in turn, trained 1,753 volunteer subdistrict AI coordinators and 25,210 village AI coordinators in more than 120 districts.
- Trained 250 commercial poultry farms in western Java in biosecurity and flock management, increasing safety and production.
